\$600M American Rescue Plan Act allocation moved to State General Fund

- Uneven recovery from pandemic
- Impacts of climate change on water and wildfire management
- Limited access to jobs in emerging industries
- Disproportionate representation of BIPOC peoples in low wage work
- Community disinvestment

PROGRAM GOALS Community Economic Resilience Fund

Purpose

Build an equitable, sustainable and resilient regional economy as CA transitions to carbon neutrality.

Strategy

Regional economic development to support equitable access to quality jobs.

- Industry led by employers and workers
 start with the jobs and build pathways into careers.
- Build collaborative, problem-solving partnership structures.
- Center voices from affected communities.

PROGRAM STRUCTURE Community Economic Resilience Fund

CERF Rolls Out in Two Phases

<u>Planning Phase I</u>: 10/22 – 6/24

- Form an inclusive planning leadership group.
- Use a decision-making process that shifts and shares power.
- Develop a regional plan based on data and community knowledge.
- Identify projects for funding.

Implementation Phase 2: TBD

- Projects recommended in planning phase.
- o Program guidelines released Fall 2022.

How we reached this milestone:
CERF Planning Network forms.

Winter 2021-2022: CERF Planning Network begins to meet.

Diverse stakeholders from Del Norte, Humboldt, Mendocino and Lake Counties.

About forty-five organizations attend.

May 2022: Nominating Committee forms.

Smaller group agrees to gather nominations:

- Help prepare the CERF proposal.
- Invite required stakeholders to join leadership group (High Road Transition Collaborative).

State releases CERF Notice of Funding May 26, 2022.

How we reached this milestone: **Organizations** selected to lead planning prepared CERF proposal.

CERF Support and Proposal Writing Team

CERF requires a Fiscal Agent and Regional Convener to support the Collaborative, planning process and community engagement.

Fiscal Agent = Arcata Economic Development

Corporation (AEDC)

Regional Convener = California Center for Rural Policy (CCRP)

Outreach and Engagement = North Coast
Opportunities (NCO)

CERF Planning Network meets in June and July to provide input on proposal.

Proposal successfully submitted July 25th.

Arcata Economic Development Corporation: Fiscal Agent

Redwood Region RISE: Vision and Goals

VISION: In the next decade, the Redwood Coast Region will become a vibrant, regenerative economy catalyzed by the implementation of community-driven innovations and collaborative governance.

GOALS: Align existing plans and develop projects to:

<u>Build economic development capacity</u> to maximize opportunities for growth and effective implementation of projects.

<u>Create an inclusive and equitable regional economic plan</u> aligned with existing plans and informed by data, community participation and community priorities.

<u>Increase diversity of the regional workforce</u> employed in high road occupations by ensuring training and pathways to flourishing-wage careers for people historically under-represented in growth sectors.

<u>Identify funding opportunities</u> driven by stakeholder participation in decision-making for priority projects.



Redwood Region RISE: Our Economy

New and Emerging Projects:

Blue Economy: The Noyo Harbor Ocean Science Center and Multi-modal project; Seawater Intake Project; The Georgia Pacific Mill Site redevelopment planning; Nordic Aquafarms; Klamath Dam removal and habitat restoration.

Green/Regenerative Economy: Blue Lake Rancheria microgrid; Humboldt Bay for off-shore wind development; CORE Hub goal to make the Region "the first proven carbon sequestering rural area by 2030;" CA Strategic Growth Council Regional Climate Collaboratives.

Broadband: Lake County Broadband Master Plan; world's longest subsea cable coming to Humboldt County in 2023. In Mendocino County, Fort Bragg has municipal broadband, and is planning more projects to expand access.

Arts, Leisure, Tourism: Lake County Tourism Improvement District and joint Recreation District. The Great Redwood Trail connecting San Francisco and Humboldt Bays; Mendocino County projects and Fort Bragg Performing Arts Center and Industrial Arts Center.

Redwood Region RISE: Our Communities

The State requires a focus on including disinvested communities:

- Identified as disadvantaged by the CA EPA
- Income at or below 80% of statewide median household income or low income by Dept. of Housing and Community Development
- High poverty area and high unemployment area by GoBIZ California Competes Tax Credit Program

Redwood Region RISE Proposed Outreach Plan

Strategy I: Communicate a cohesive, transparent regional message.

- Interactive regional web-based platform, linguistically and ADA accessible
- Transparent feedback loop that centers cross-regional community voices and the Redwood Economic Collaborative (REC)
- Multilingual community survey processes to improve participation and address barriers

Strategy 2: Develop support structures in each County.

- County specific leadership teams that mirror and support REC "team of teams"
- Provide meeting, training and other supports to grow local support and acknowledge the strengths and challenges of the entire region throughout the planning process
- Pair traditional economic development stakeholders with leaders from disinvested communities

Redwood Region RISE: Outreach Plan

Strategy 3: Address equity and overcome traditional power imbalances

- Train all stakeholders to incorporate Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion practices; understand Tribal sovereignty and cultural humility; and consider traditional knowledges in climate change strategies
- Fund trusted CBOs and grassroots organizations to outreach and meaningfully engage residents with local and regional planning tables; formalize participation and governance processes
- Assure each County specific leadership team is led or co-led by a trusted local organization working with populations historically excluded from planning and economic development processes.

Redwood Economic Collaborative: Proposed Consensus Governance

The Redwood Economic Collaborative will form work groups focused on CERF Goals.

The Collaborative will be led by a Steering Committee formed by 2 nominees from each work group.

A Review Caucus comprised of BIPOC members will advise on policy, strategy, inclusion.

Every County will form a Local Leadership Team.

Local Leadership Teams will be co-led by an organization or member from a disinvested community.
